

What differences are different?

Forms of Speech: like vs. as, what vs which, so vs such, ...

Prepositions: in vs. on, at vs. in, to vs at ...

General Vocab/ Trip vs. travel, take care vs. be careful,

Expressions: nervous, vs. excited...

Verbs: say vs tell, hear vs listen, see vs. look vs. watch...





like vs. as

As = equal to (the same)

He works as a journalist. (He is a journalist)

Trabaja de periodista.





He works like a journalist. (He is not a journalist)

Trabaja como periodista.

They taste like chicken. (It is not chicken!! What are they?!)







what vs. which

What flavour of ice cream do you like? (of all possible flavours)
Which flavour do you want? (limeted selection)

What type of car do you drive? Which car would you like?







so vs. such

So + adjective Such + noun

It is so big, that it doesn't fit in the car.

She was so happy she couldn't stop smiling all day!

The car had such a small trunk/boot that all the suitcases couldn't fit.

It was such a disturbing movie that I haven't been able to stop thinking of it all day!





every day vs. all day

every day = cada dia all day = todo el dia

I have meetings every day. (cada dia)
I have meetings all day (this week only) (todo el dia)

Common error: Next week I have meetings all the day.

>>> Next week I have meetings every day.





finally vs. at the end vs. in the end

finally = por ultimo, por fin at the end = location of place / time IN THE END = AL FINAL

After waiting an hour we finally were able to see a doctor.

At the end of the movie I cried.

In the end we had a great time.

Common error: : Finally, we couldn't go. (por fin, no pudimos ir) >>> At the end we couldn't go.

>>> In the end, we couldn't go.





be vs. stay

be = estar

stay = quedar

I will be there tomorrow at 3pm.

I will stay overnight at the airport hotel.

common error: I will stay there tomorrow at 3pm. common error: We will stay at 7pm in the plaza (= Hemos quedado en la plaza a las 7pm.)

>>> We are meeting in the square/plaza at 7pm.



ON OVER ABOVE











trip vs. travel

to travel = viajar a trip = un viaje travels = viajes a travel = NO!

I want to travel to Kenya.

Her trip to the Morocco was challenging.

His travels through Africa changed his life!





politics, politicians, policies, police

politics = la pólitica
a politician = un pólitico
policies = la políticas
incurance policy = un póliza
police = la policía

Politics is the art where people give power to politicians, and they then paint the policy.

In the case of theft, my insurance policy requires a police report.





nervous vs. excited

nervous = feeling insecure excited = feeling extra energy for something good

It's normal to feel nervous before giving a presentation.

There's nothing like kids feeling excited Christmas morning.





familiar vs. family

familiar = well known from long or close association. family = relating to the members of the family

We always go on a family vacation in August.

His face looks familiar

This is a familiar situation.





have nothing to do with vs. no comparison

have nothing to do with = have no association no comparison = not equal in quality or characteristics

The team losing has nothing to do with the coach. It is the players' fault.

There is no comparison between a store-bought and a homemade 'tortilla de patata'.





take care vs. be careful

Take care = Cuídate.

Be careful! = ¡Ten cuidado!

Watch out! = ¡Ten cuidado!

It was great to meet you. Have a safe trip back and take care until next time.

London's way of saying 'Be careful!' in the subway (tube) is saying 'Mind the gap!'





let vs. leave

let = permitir (dejar) leave = dejar (poner, abandonar)

The don't let you smoke anywhere inside the airport.
You can leave a comment at the end of the course.
We have to leave early today in order not to get stuck in traffic.





say vs. tell

say the words/idea tell the person

They told her not to park on that street, but she didn't listen to what they said.

When he said "I love you." he didn't really mean it. Can you please tell us where the museum is.





come vs. go

RETURN (volver):
come (here)
go (there)

I have to leave to go to the site inspection. I'll be back (return) in the office by 13:00.

I'll come back (here) to the office by 13:00.

If it goes well, I won't have to go back (there) tomorrow.





make vs. earn vs. win

earn money = work for it with dedication and effort
make money = increase the amount
win money = receive due to a competition or lottery
get money = receive/acquire money

The company worked hard last year to earn what it did.

The money in the bank doesn't earn much interest.

What's the best way I can make more money?

Everybody hopes the will win 'el gordo' at Christmas.





hear vs. listen

hear = physical ability. listen = with attention and mental focus

Do you hear that bird? Yeah, listen to how it sings! Can you hear that bird? No I can't.





lose vs. miss vs. waste

lose = cease to have or retain (something) (something in your possession)

miss = fail to hit, reach, come into contact with, catch or understand waste = use or expend carelessly, extravagantly, or to no purpose

I've lost my keys. I don't know where I left them
I missed the meeting last week. What did they say?
Hurry so we don't miss the bus!
The town has wasted a lot of money on the roundabout that no one likes.
